Excerpts from Freddie's archives: "Objectives of Camp Rising Sun"

ON THE VALUE OF EDUCATING FOR LEADERSHIP:

We have so often heard it said that "quality pays." Working with the finest raw materials, hiring the most skilled workmen or engaging the best artists is always the best policy. Why not apply this to the education and training of human beings? The world needs leaders, needs them badly and we feel that more time, effort and thought should be given to them in all branches of education. We sincerely feel that the extra effort and training given to them will in the end benefit the citizenry at large. The country has felt the need and value in

establishing West Point and the Naval Academy to train leaders for our military protection. In a far broader sense, vast numbers of leaders are needed if we are to progress socially under enlightened quidance. It is our intention to explore this field of youth education and to show how we have approached the challenge.

ON ONE'S MORAL COMPASS:

Probably the most important instrument which a sailor or explorer possesses is his compass for without it his chance of reaching his goal is limited or the goal is reached only after costly mistakes and loss of time and energy. The human, too, has his compass to be used in the journey through life. That compass is called his philosophy of living and is closely bound up with his code of ethics. It has been our belief that this is one of the most vital things for a youth to acquire. He may not call it by that name - it sounds too much like school - but in the day when his thoughts bend in this direction, he ceases to be entirely a child and the man to be is taking shape.

ON EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING:

Every now and then we hear of a "self made man" who has attained prominence in his field with the barest of schooling. We have wondered if the possession of a vast fund of information without the ability to use it is of as much value as the possession of less knowledge and the ability to utilize it. Life for this "self made man" has always been a struggle with the problems of life. No one ever told him "This is a fact," or "That cannot be done." When he came to a stone wall he did not stop and give up. He sought a way over it, under it or around it or if still impeded, blasted a hole through it. If you have occasion to meet men of this type you will generally find their thinking simple, direct and concise. This ability to simplify problems and search for the essentials is characteristic of leaders both educated and uneducated. It comes through actual contact with problems in practice.

The Practical (and Lighter) Side of Freddie:

Before the start of camp season be sure to swell axe and hammer handles on their heads. During winter they dry out and shrink from heads with resulting danger of flying off.

On opening day of camp, a brief talk should be given on water being different at camp from city water and may cause constipation. It's not unmanly to report this to first aid counselor who may recommend a mild laxative.

Print all camper and staff addresses in last issue of camp paper. Suggest a counselor check addresses on the stencil as the campers usually make at least one mistake.

During season, camp director should make periodic checks to see if prevailing system for writing one letter home, minimum, is being observed. Also, system prevailing about soap showers.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: CHANGE AND STABILITY

e live in a biological world characterized by growth, development and maturation and, by necessity, change. One of the ironies of life is that stability is more likely to be achieved by programmed change, which allows for flexibility and adaptation. Instability is more likely to occur when there is resistance to change or failure to adapt. This is as true for organizations as it is for individuals and for this reason programmed change has become a central part of our governance process. This is by way of pointing out that there will be a programmed change in the leadership of LAJF as I complete my term as President in April, 2012 and Nita Luis takes over. Nita chaired the second Board Effectiveness Committee as well as the Strategic Planning Committee and has been intimately involved in all of the major decisions and activities during the past three years, so the transition to the new leadership should be seamless. Our new governance structure also allows for phased-in personnel change on our committees as well as the Board so we can attract the talent and skills we need while maintaining continuity. Board directors serve threeyear terms, renewable for a maximum of three terms.


There were many highlights during my tenure as President, including 1) the recruitment of Dr. Judith Fox as our Executive Director, 2) a series of retreats for Board members and alumni to begin the process of reenergizing our alumni, 3) two outstanding summer seasons at both Red Hook and Clinton, 4) strengthening an already strong board by increasing the skills

and diversity of the Board, 5) first prize for governance from VCG - Governance Matters, 6) the branding committee after reviewing 187 entries selected "creating a better world tomorrow by inspiring young leaders today," 7) doubling the funds contributed to the Foundation in two consecutive years and 8) extending the tradition of strong committee participation, able committee leadership and meaningful work.

Although the Board and the staff are proud of what they have accomplished in recent years working as a team, none of this would have been possible without the efforts of previous

Rising Suns who sustained the Foundation over the decades, going back to Mandy Mascia. The numbers are too great to list, but you know who you are.

challenging but the future of LAJF and CRS looks promising as we adapt to make the necessary changes that allow us to carry out our mission. ♦

OUR PROGRAM: IT FEELS RIGHT BUT DO WE REALLY KNOW?

This is the question members of the Program Committee ask themselves about a CRS summer. Educators and our own alumni report that what they observe at camp are a coherent curriculum, thoughtful methodology, constructive interactions and upbeat attitudes. Campers talk about life-transforming empowerment and enduring lessons. The Program Committee is seeking to document how, to what extent and why these observations are accurate.

Evaluation of the short- and long-term impact of a CRS summer began more than five years ago with a broadly distributed "outcomes survey" that was analyzed for relevance and statistical significance. That formed the basis for a manuscript submitted for publication to a professional journal. Many of you probably responded to the survey. Thank you!

More recently, the Program Committee has been working to develop instruments that demonstrate and measure the degree of program success. Instructions, Projects, Evening Program and all the other familiar elements of a CRS summer are evaluated by campers, staff and visitors, alike. We also assess the camper's perception of his/her knowledge about, experience with and confidence in being able to perform activities that relate to CRS's four goals: intellectual and artistic growth, leadership, diversity and the drive to make the world a better place. Next steps include devising ways to establish the enduring nature of the impact of CRS on adults over the course of their lives at work, with their families, in their communities and for the betterment of society.

TO WHAT END?

There are five good reasons to continue this work. Our Program Committee strives to:

- Make sure the CRS curriculum is at the forefront of educational practices.
- 2. Prove that we are actually doing what we think we are doing (and that our campers perceive it as we do).
- 3. Assess the impact of CRS on the lives of our alumni and on the worlds they touch.
- 4. Demonstrate evidence of effectiveness to our alumni, our donors and our philanthropic partners.
- 5. Assure that our program can serve as a model for other educational leadership programs. ◆

LAJF BOARD RECOGNIZED FOR OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT

How, how to our own LAJF Board of Directors for winning the prestigious Brooke W. Mahoney Award for Outstanding Board

Leadership, given annually by VCG Governance Matters, New York's premiere organization working to build excellence in nonprofit board governance.

New York's leading nonprofit board professionals gathered on May 10, 2011 on the 50th floor of the McGraw Hill Building at Rockefeller Center to support the field of five finalists: Make a Wish Foundation of Metro NY, Essex County CASA, Harlem RBI, Urban Education Exchange and the Louis August Jonas Foundation. Much was said about the excellence of all five boards and their similarities: a deep passion for their mission; being unafraid to lead; a strategic approach to board recruitment: and an active and productive committee structure.

The judges felt that the LAJF Board stood out from the rest. In announcing the winner, David LaGreca, the Executive Director of VCG Governance Matters described the journey that our 80+ year-old foundation has taken over the past three years. Mr. LaGreca drifted from the script as he related how touched the judges were by their personal inter-

view with Board President Dr. Robert Mellins during which he described the lasting impact of our program on him since he was a camper in 1945. Mr. LaGreca added how impressed the judges were by LAJF's openness to feedback



publicity.

On September 15, 2011, Bob Mellins was invited to participate on a panel discussion of Board Presidents: "What Can Board Chairs Do to Make Boards Work?" sponsored by VCG Governance Matters at Baruch College, in New York City. Several of our Board and staff members attended, with great pride.

IN CHALLENGING TIMES, OVERSTRETCHED BOARD MEMBERS FIGHT BURNOUT

A charity that came close to shutting down because of the recession but instead reinvigorated itself and its board is the Louis August Jonas Foundation, which operates a seven-week international leadership camp for 120 teenagers every year in upstate New York. Donors rebelled in 2009 after trustees decided to suspend Camp Rising Sun, as the leadership program is called.

The charity had plenty of reasons to take the action: Its endowment had dropped by 45 percent and its executive director had left. But the camp's closure infuriated many donors, most of whom had gone there as youths. They withheld their annual gifts in protest.

In response, Robert B. Mellins, the Board president and a Columbia University professor of pediatric pulmonary medicine, led the organization in a sweeping effort to regain donors' confidence and improve the board.

The organization hired a new executive director, Judith Fox, who accompanied board members to four weekend retreats, each with 15 former campers and donors, to find out what they liked and disliked about the organization and to get their ideas for ensuring the camp's long-term survival. The group then quickly adopted the best ideas, including several changes to the board.

Now, for example, former campers and others who are not trustees can serve on board committees. That not only helps the board get its work done but also provides new perspectives and a pool of candidates who may become trustees later.

Other changes included creating a new trustee committee that looks for ways to improve the board. It has adopted regular self-evaluations, created an orientation for new board members, and brought more women and younger people onto the board. In another step to avoid burnout, the board created a succession plan for trustees. It now appoints a president-elect, and it has carved out a formal position for the board's immediate past president.

Altogether, the changes have strengthened the 81-year-old organization. Annual gifts will surpass \$700,000 this year, after declining to \$128,000 in 2009 during the worst of the crisis. And the board and its committees now have waiting lists of people eager to join.

Because of those achievements, the Louis August Jonas Foundation captured an award this year for outstanding board leadership. Says Mr. LaGreca, of Governance Matters, which bestowed the award: "This is a story of a board who had a leader rejuvnate the organization with shock paddles and jump start the board. This highlights the flip side of burnout."

he story of the Dutch AA is about both a family of campers and true leaders who have been very active as alumni to ensure that the experience they had would be available to later generations. Many volunteer. Many participate. Many provide financial support.

OUR SELECTION TRADITION IS AT THE CORE OF THE AA: In the beginning, selection was coordinated by the Ministry of Education. Boat fares were sponsored by the Holland America Line from Rotterdam Harbor to NYC. This has evolved over many decades into a strong tradition to select campers in the Netherlands.

Our selection process is formal with regard to communication with schools and families. At the same time, we create the informal environment that we all associate with CRS. For many years, Luwe Beijerman '59 and his wife Ireen Beijerman-Averink hosted interview day at their beautiful home. Many of us share memories of having been selected in their cozy living room. Luwe passed away last year leaving quite a gap in the Dutch Alumni family. Harrie Hamstra '71 and his wife Liesbeth Smit hosted selection at their lovely home last year and will also do so in 2012.

The prior year's campers volunteer as contact persons to the pupils who receive the general invitation to apply. A delegation of selectors schedules personal visits with the parents/quardians to answer questions, explain the impact of a summer at CRS and show how invested they are personally with CRS.

OUR REUNIONS: We gather biennially for our alumni reunions at the home of one of our members. Our day long reunions, which bring together alumni from all three camps and many generations, allow for socializing and formal AA business but are also dedicated to getting to know a little bit about the area where the host lives. CAMPER FOR LIFE AN INTERVIEW WITH HARRIE HAMSTRA, 71

Harrie, you clearly have a pronounced passion for camp, Freddie's mission and the Dutch Rising Sun community. What keeps you tethered to CRS? I am grateful for the opportunity I had to participate in the LAJF program in 1971. That summer had an important impact on my life - as I came to realize more and more in the years following my summer in CRS. One of the core elements in that impact was the experience of sharing the same human core values with boys from so very different backgrounds. Freddie's message that we - as selected campers - were given a special opportunity in that summer program, which gave us a responsibility to pass it on, touched me deeply. One of the obvious ways of passing this on was to take responsibility in the Dutch Alumni Association that grew over the years.

You are involved throughout The Netherlands in creating environmentally sustainable housing. What kind of impact do you hope to have in this realm? My goal here is to make the link between the technical choices (renewable building materials, low or no emission, etc.) and the way the people use their housing. The awareness of the daily behavior of people is a very important factor in reducing our ecological footprint to a sustainable level. And the immediate living conditions (city planning, architecture and actual building techniques) are an important factor for the growth of a human community. I became involved with a few people starting a sustainable housing project in my home town of Zwolle in 1993, and with the inspiring experience of creating the housing where we live ourselves. I also took upon myself to support other groups to create their own sustainable housing projects - something that I do as a volunteer.

You have already made a very important impact within your local and national community. Do you consider yourself a role model? A leader? This is a difficult question to answer for oneself, I think. When I look at the roles I play in different situations and groups, I often think about the phrase 'a good leader is a good follower' that CRS taught me. I have been able to help making dreams and visions come true; in that sense I think people see me as a leader. And in helping people and groups to make choices, I have my own ideas about the right direction to go, realizing that often more ways will get us and the group to the same goals.

The theme of this issue of the Sundial is "Camper for Life." What does it mean to you? Being a "camper for life" means to me that the inspiration that Freddie shared with me, the spirit of giving - of my talents to my community - is an essential part of my life. And one of the aspects is continuing my support to give talented young people the chance to have a similar existential experience in a CRS program! ◆




S: WHAT IS YOUR IMPRESSION OF THE CRS ALUMNI NETWORK AND HOW IT CAN GROW?





INTER-GENERATIONAL DIPLOMACY

Ian Benjamin '10-'11 describes the relationship and lessons that developed when he befriended a local garbage hunter.





MISHA AND IAN AT THEIR RUSSIAN LESSON

have been learning Russian this year thanks to a man whom I met while he was digging through my family's trash one day. He is an elderly Ukrainian immigrant who looks a lot like Santa Claus would if Papa Noël had steelworker tattoos and a cast-iron grip. His path brought him through a tremendous leap of faith from the outskirts of Kiev, Ukraine to my front stoop in Brooklyn. Like many immigrants, he risked all that he had and knew for an uncertain shot at the American dream. He seems to have stumbled on the dismount of his great economic leap.

This man, named Misha, is a garbage picker. He is semi-homeless, braving the elements to harvest our neighborhood's recyclable trash in all weather, yet can barely scrape together enough for a loaf of bread at the supermarket where he takes his cans. His job, to most people, would be the end of the line in a worst-case scenario. But not to Misha. He is smart about it. He has a bicycle. He is an expert at loading it up; he knows which houses are the best places to look; and he successfully races the garbage men and of competing hunters. His work may look simple, almost mindless; but, he plays it as well as he can. Struggle has kept his muscles in shape and his mind focused, if on nothing more than on how he is going to make enough money to be able to eat.

FEATURED ARTICLE

Before his late wife, Soffia, died, Misha worried a lot about how to get food for her. And when she was diagnosed with cancer, he naturally worried for her health. But their love was such that she would give him her food so that he could eat. That is generosity: giving when it hurts. Billionaires do not feel their giving as much as when Misha walked past the supermarket where he redeems his cans, and carried food home for his wife. But his heart, like his mind, is master of his impulses. He goes out rain or shine, bending over garbage can after garbage can to pick recyclables, so that at the end of the day he can bring home some bread and bananas. He is the defiant image of courage and generosity. The absence of despair in him is proof.

Change of Plans

Learning Russian was not part of my original plan, but I realized that my previous efforts to help Misha were disenfranchising him. I had helped Misha as a charitable project, giving him food and money every time we crossed paths. I did that for two years. But, I was not yet sensitive to his side of the equation: that he was accepting charity from a kid, and that, for all his strength, it was embarrassing and cost him something on the inside worth much more than money. As my friendship with Misha grew, I began to understand that what this dignified man needed from me was not only food or money (though he was in desperate need of both); it was a chance to do work that helped him help someone else. After a lot of brainstorming, the obvious finally dawned on me. Misha is a native speaker of one of the most important languages spoken in the world. And, if I asked him nicely enough, he could be my teacher. What Misha has taught me since, in addition to the various forms of Russian verbs, is how lucky I am to be well off in our country. Now,

I give Misha \$10.00 cash at each Russian lesson that we have together. He has always been awkward about taking money from me, and I really do have to make it clear that I appreciate his help and would feel bad if he did not let me pay him for it. The lessons occur while we dine over a home-cooked meal in my front yard, and I always help him pack up a few bags of groceries on his bike before he rides away. Through our exchange, I am trying to carve out a Good Place for him, an island of friendship, refuge and welcome in a neighborhood where he otherwise is unknown and cast out. It is something I know he looks forward to, as do I.

I confess that I have also bitten off more than I can comfortably chew, adding Russian to a course load of Chinese, 3 math classes and the full complement of theatre/literature as a theatre major in my senior year. I never get comfortably ahead; I do not have the time to take breaks; I am constantly triaging work priorities; I am up late and wake before the sun and still am always racing to get things done on time. But, I do it because Misha, while at the end of his rope, has only one comment: "Я работаю"--Ya rabotayu--I am working. I work as hard as I can to honor that motto. I just got my report card and Misha was so proud of me getting the highest mark in my class (and the highest possible mark) in Russian. Now that I know how to complain a bit in Russian, I am impressed that Misha never does it.

Modern Inversion

Since our lessons began, I have found a group willing to take him in. It is a religious community, similar to a Kibbutz, that runs organic farms across New England. The funny thing is, working on a farm would not be that different from collecting the cans and bottles that are

now Misha's livelihood. Farm work and can collection may seem totally different, but, there is much of the same physical labor in reaching down to pick up cans and bottles as in reaching down to pick organic fruits and vegetables. What will be different is the context: a connection to the Earth and to other people. Misha now floats on the margins of society, but at the religious center he would be part of a community. Much like at camp, the farm is a patchwork quilt.

But Misha is proud. The modern inversion where parents ask kids for help with technology strikes him as almost heretical. I have had to learn to make Misha feel special by receiving his help. I have learned to be a diplomat for my generation on a stage of inter-generational diplomacy. Getting to know Misha and his language in its humor and tragicomic lyricism has been a camp experience writ small. It has opened a whole other world, a chance for me to see America from the point of view of an economic refugee.

Misha is hesitant to accept the invitation to the farming community, afraid of being stranded from the few countrymen he congregates with locally. But each day is a masterpiece with Misha, which is why I admire him. Our friendship remains an ongoing discussion, an exercise in inter-generational and international diplomacy. We will work this out, too. Ya rabotayu. •

A PORTRAIT OF SELF-DISCOVERY

Tehran. Tina Gharavi '93
made her way through
security at Imam
Khomeini International Airport,
hard drives full of raw footage
in tow. After three weeks of
filming under often tense
circumstances--their permission
certificate had been a loaner from
another film--director Gharavi
was prepared to return to
England. It was then, as she
neared the departure gate,
that officers pulled her aside.

In the half hour that followed, she waited nervously, contemplated the risks taken and feared the worst--the demise of her debut feature film, "I Am Nasrine," then in its fifth year of development. Unlike other foreigners who were being arrested at the time on mostly speculative grounds, Tina Gharavi's work in Iran made her an easy target. "I had actually spent the previous three weeks in and around Tehran shooting a full-on feature film that really focused on what was going on in the country at that time. It wouldn't have been difficult to prove that I was anti-regime," she says.

Then Gharavi benefited from an unexpected bit of luck. Originally born in Iran, she had an Iranian passport but was not fluent in Farsi, so, when the officers began to question her, they realized that a common language barely existed between them. The officers "laughed, half disbelieving that someone with an Iranian passport couldn't speak Farsi and half-embarrassed at their own lack of English. Shaking their heads—and perhaps not wanting an incident on their watch they waved me through. But it wasn't until we touched down on the tarmac in Dubai that I really started to believe I'd gotten away with it."

Gharavi's luck in escaping unharmed has allowed her to share a story of someone whose departure from Iran was much more fraught. In the film, "I Am Nasrine," showing in limited release now around the world, protagonist Nasrine (Micsha Sadeghi) is detained and subsequently assaulted by police after being caught on a motorcycle with a man. In the aftermath, her well-to-do family sends her from the country with her brother Ali (Shiraz Haq). Trekking through mountainsides and catching

numerous trains, the two eventually arrive in Tyneside, England, where they begin a process of transition and adaptation that serves as a caricature of the modern refugee experience and the personal struggles and growth that arise as a result.

"I Am Nasrine" is a portait of self-discovery

nested in dislocation. Thrust into a small British community, Nasrine struggles to navigate the freedoms of her new country and reactions afforded by the local community. While Nasrine's physical differences--her darker skin, dress and accent--elicit strange looks and outright hostility from some of Tyneside's inhabitants, she is eventually befriended by members of a travelling community. Sharing in the transience of her new life, Nasrine's friends become a support system through which she eases into the transition between Iranian and British society. Nasrine's gradual introduction to her new home is a counterpoint to Ali's, whose struggles with issues of identity and local customs pose a daily challenge. Together, however, Ali and Nasrine carve from chaos a life for themselves that is rich with humor, the mundane, tragedy, beauty and ultimately self-discovery.

Gharavi, herself, was a child of constant flux. She moved regularly and was separated from her mother for 23 years after emigrating from Iran as a child in 1979. The experience of growing up as an Iranian woman in American society was both challenging and fundamental to her future life aspirations. She rarely saw depictions in the media that fit her identity; much like Nasrine, she was an outsider in a new home.

In the summer of 1993, Gharavi was a counselor at CRS - Clinton, which afforded her an opportunity to confront her feelings of displacement. "Every journey is

so complex and unique and taking a path which is less travelled makes young people feel like outsiders. Clinton Corners was a chance to change the conversation, the context. Suddenly, I was in a community where difference was celebrated and diversity was the norm. That was healthy. Also connecting to nature was healthy. I think that is the genius of Clinton Corners, its location and how it forces you to be in that space and confront stuff without be-

ing able to look for distractions or running

Eventually, Gharavi's passion for diversity and story telling led her to film making. Her autobiographical documentary "Mother/Country" tracks her journey to Iran after 23 years away and back to her mother. There, she also reconnected with Iranian culture and began sowing the seeds of "I Am Nasrine." According the Gharavi, "I realized I wanted to tell the story of first generation migrants— those who are neither from the East nor the West. I wanted to make those who don't understand the exile experience to feel what it is like to come from one place and be forced to go to another to survive." She also drew heavily from both personal and research material. "The character of Nasrine is a composite of many of the women I worked with over a period of eight years as I developed the script. I set up a filmmaking group in 2001, teaching adults and subsequently young adults how to make films and tell their stories. At that same time I was writing this script which I would also share with the group. However, in the end there are masses of myself in the character because I could only write what I know." In Nasrine as both a character and a film. Gharavi creates a living, breathing expression of Iranian exile.

On its surface, "I Am Nasrine," is about dislocation as it portrays refugees between

Iran and Britain. It is believable in its cultural specificity and in harnessing several human stories of immigration and exile into one representative whole.

The film, however, also goes much further, condensing the experience of forced migration into the themes of dislocation, confusion and self-definition at their core. As a man spits at Nasrine while she leaves her building or Ali builds community working in a pizza shop operated by other undocumented workers, it is easy to see portions of the film as anecdotes that are representative of a global whole. They might as easily apply to the waves of Hispanic and Latin American immigration in the United States or North Africans in Southern Europe. Gharavi succeeds in fashioning a voice for the modern refugee, one in which access to basic needs such as food. water and shelter are at first glance within arm's reach, but increasingly hard to acguire as a consequence of complicated and seemingly global, systems of discrimination and identity politics. From its fraught opening scenes to its tense final moments and the challenges, humor and magic in between, "I Am Nasrine" is an enjoyable and insightful take on relocation and immigration, and Gharavi has succeeded in capturing it. As she says, "Though we may seem very different, we have many commonalities. The exile experience is familiar to many people; increasingly so as we navigate identity, place and belonging." ♦



It is a pleasure to share with you on the following pages, the names of hundreds of Camp Rising Sun alumni, family and friends as well as the corporations and foundations who supported the Louis August Jonas Foundation in 2011. Your gifts not only provide scholarships for Camp Rising Sun but also support our extraordinary network of alumni around the world. LAJF is most grateful to the 25 active alumni associations, many of which fund travel expenses for the young leaders from their regions who attend camp.

Our alumni care most about Camp Rising Sun: the place, the people and the programs. To be sure those are in top form requires caring about the bottom line.

In 2009, our endowment was valued at \$8 million. As a result of investment management and growth, as of December 31, 2011, it was \$10.2 million. While this is good news, it needs to be considered together with our annual expenses and our potential for financial growth in order to get a full picture of the financial health of LAJF.

Development staff salaries, donor database management, all fundraising materials.


From October 1, 2010 - September 30, 2011, LAJF raised \$851,027 in contributions and grants. By policy and regulation the Board authorized \$576,675 from the endowment toward expenses. We withdrew an additional \$124,162 from the endowment last year to balance actual costs.





Two life altering summers as a camper ignited my passion for having a positive impact on the world. I loved the program for the hope and capacity it inspired. Time passed; I adventured, returned as a counselor, and then went adventuring again.

As a camper, the experience was life altering in ways bordering on magical. As a counselor, crafting that magic made me aware of the near-constant work with campers that it took to facilitate a CRS summer. The experience was as challenging as it was rewarding.

I find myself again immersed in the great cause. I now understand a little more about the complexity and sophistication of the organizational system that makes CRS possible. With a desk and laptop as my sturdy tools, I sit directly across from Christine, on the diagonal from Helene's corner desk and mere steps away from both Judy and Ruthellen's offices. I share space with the coveted coffee maker and work in the once mysterious realm known as "communications" -- oh, how adventures do sneak up on a man! At the LAJF office, days are characterized by collaboration, teamwork and passion. Whether we are celebrating fundraising achievements, fistbumping to progress on the revamped Sundial or discussing strategic issues, I continuously feel bolstered by the spirit of camaraderie that permeates.

My current work at LAJF is part communications and part connecting the dots of my decade with CRS. The wordplay between "organization" and "organism" resonates more strongly every day. If we think of CRS as one living being and of LAJF as another, then the Foundation is also the energy source that fuels the entire ecosystem. Here, a mix of business administration, program direction, alumni relations, communications, camper selection, committee work, board action and fundraising coalesce into a driving force for camper and alumni development. We are immersed in creative ideas. The endowment, alumni giving, planning and implementation are conjoined in service of both our Global Alumni Network program and Camp Rising Sun, which started it all. LAJF is the nexus, and, at least for now, I have the opportunity to participate in its often unseen but frequently felt adventures. •

The fund has been seeded by the generous contributions of our alumni, friends and family and is named in memory of Pavel Hristov '97, '98, a CRS alumnus whose friendship and inspiration have been very important to many of his CRS friends, including me.

I met Pavel when we were teenagers in Bulgaria. I was quiet, older, bookish; he was slightly rebellious, artistically talented and extremely popular. He was the boy who everyone wanted as a friend, because he had a talent to deeply care for the people near his heart, to really listen and to really laugh. In fact, he knew exactly how to evoke laughter from the most stubbornly difficult moods. He had an incredible, big smile – the kind with shiny sparkles in the eyes – which melted your heart. When he was onstage (which he often was), he became unrecognizable. If he wanted to, one day he could have become a memorable actor – only one among many memorable things he could do. Pavel was a dear friend who inspired me to think harder and be more positive, and remains a daily influence.

People who have moved on from this life withhold the chance to show us what would have happened to them next. But with the memory of Pavel alive in his friends and his legacy sharp in everything he touched, we have his "next" as he continues to make us more optimistic, more caring, more grateful for what we have. Through his lasting gift to us, as well as through this scholarship, we hope that other young people from around the world will discover beauty in what they do and will bring smiles to the faces of their friends.





LAJF EXTENDS OUR DEEPEST SYMPATHY TO THE FAMILIES AND FRIENDS OF THESE CRS ALUMNI.



PETER DANIEL CHABRIS '32, '33, '39 died May 19, 2011 at his home in Cincinnati. He was 93. The son of Italian immigrants, Peter

graduated from Columbia University with a degree in English. He served in the US Army during World War II. Peter's professional life included executive positions in human resources and industrial relations at AT&T. W.R. Grace. Xerox, Travers Insurance Co. and Interpublic Group of Companies. Peter was a Renaissance man, fluent in several languages, an international traveler, accomplished chess player, musician, sculptor, expert swimmer and devotee of opera and classical music.



DAVID R. COLMAN, PH.D. '64, served as Director of the Montreal Neurological Institute and Hospital until his death on June 1,

2011. David was passionate about his family, science, art, cooking, heritage plants, old movies and so much more. His intelligence, entrepreneurial spirit and wonderful sense of humor will be deeply missed. Born in New York, Dave attended Bronx High School of Science, received his BS from New York University and his doctorate in neuroscience from State University of New York. He held faculty positions at New York University School of Medicine and the Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons, where he received several prestigious awards. Dave approached science with a strong conviction in basic, curiosity-driven research and he believed in approaching problems from every angle. This commitment led to

the multidisciplinary neuroengineering program at McGill and innovative programs in neuropalliative care, as well as a major expansion in brain imaging at "The Neuro."



THOMAS FULTON '42 -

45, a longtime physics professor at the Johns Hopkins University who swapped notes with the great minds of

science, died of heart failure on April 8, 2011 at the age of 83. Born Tamas Feuerzeug, in Budapest, Hungary, he immigrated to the United States with his family in 1941 at the age of 14. His immediate family fled Nazis in Hungary and Germany, where many of his other family members died in the Holocaust. Thomas graduated from Stuyvesant High School and Harvard College where he graduated with high honors, earning a bachelor's degree in physics in 1950. He went on to earn a doctorate in physics from Harvard University in 1954. After completing his doctorate, Dr. Fulton spent two years at the Princeton Institute for Advanced Study, working under J. Robert Oppenheimer, scientific director of the Manhattan Project, which developed the atomic bomb. At Johns Hopkins, Thomas became the "founding father" of the particle theory group which launched research in the high-energy domain of physics. Thomas enjoyed classical music, opera and art. He also enjoyed photography, politics, spoke several languages and traveled extensively.



VIGGO HARTZ '50,

Danish alumnus, died on October 17, 2011 at the age of 77. As one of the founders and an active member of the CRS

Alumni Association of Denmark throughout his life, he was known to many CRS alumni. Viggo played an important role in the planning of CRS-Europe in Stendis, as a member of the board of The George E. Jonas Foundation (GEJF), as the camper selection contact to 45 countries and as a "father figure" to 400 campers from 2001-2009. In Denmark, Viggo was a well known math teacher of elementary school, being active in the math teachers' organization, serving

as editor of the math teachers' journal, and as an author of didactic books and articles. Together with his wife, Hanne Hartz, who died in 2009, he had a large circle of colleagues and friends. In the Danish Alumni Association, Viggo was chairman of the Danish camper selection committee 1977-1996. He participated in the annual New Year Reunions throughout almost sixty years; everyone benefitting from his warm and empathic personality.



SIDNEY LUMET '39,

a director who preferred the streets of New York to the back lots of Hollywood and whose stories of con-

science — 12 Angry Men, Serpico, Dog Day Afternoon, The Verdict, Network became modern American film classics. died April 2, 2011 at his home in Manhattan. He was 86. He achieved critical and commercial success with his first film, 12 Angry Men, which established his credentials as a liberal director who was sympathetic to actors, loved words and worked quickly. For the bulk of his career, he averaged a film a year, earning four Oscar nominations. Lumet's book Making Movies, a lucid account of all aspects of the film business, used his own works for textual analysis and included a coda, almost a lament, in which he railed against the studios' interference. He had become increasingly aware that there was little space, even in his beloved New York, for works inspired by social commitment and passion; less still for those derived from great plays and literature. "While the goal of all movies is to entertain," Mr. Lumet once wrote, "the kind of film in which I believe goes one step further. It compels the spectator to examine one facet or another of his own conscience. It stimulates thought and sets the mental juices flowing."



GUNNAR RIBERHOLDT '49. Danish alumnus. died of cancer on

September 17, 2011. Gunnar was an outstanding and influen-

tial ambassador, especially to the EU and NATO, until his retirement at 70 years. He took an important part in the

negotiations of the Maastricht Treaty up to 1972. Gunnar was an important part of the CRS Alumni Association of Denmark during its first many years, being part of the group who arranged four Nordic CRS Reunions in the 60's, and held a lecture on the EU at the CRS World Reunion in Denmark in 1995. He was the first chairman of the Danish camper selection committee 1963-1969, and during the first years of the CRS-Europe in Stendis, he chaired its International Advisory Council. Gunnar had wide interests in arts and music. especially jazz, and for some years he arranged for the European camp to be visited by a European jazz orchestra.

HAROLD M. SILVER, MD '41, '42,

a pulmonologist who practiced medicine in Washington, DC for 35 years, died Dec. 26, 2011 at the age of 83. A native of the Bronx, NY, Harold received a bachelor's degree in 1946 and a medical degree in 1949, both from Columbia University. He had a successful private practice from 1957 until retiring in 1992. He was a clinical faculty member at George Washington University's School of Medicine from the 1950s until 1992. He was also chairman of the medical department at Sibley Memorial Hospital in the early 1990s.

Ted Wright '39-'43 remembers Harold: My old friend, Dr. Harold Silver, died around the first of the year. I always tried to visit him when I was in the DC area. We often reminisced about Rising Sun and about the memorable day in August, 1945, when he (in the Navy) and I (in the Army) met for a drink somewhere around Times Square, on the night when it became known that the first atomic bomb had been dropped on Hiroshima. That momentous event made us feel happy at what it meant for our own military futures (no fighting in the Far East) but somber at the thought of what it probably threatened for the future of the world.


